

## **Federal Contract Services**

As a critical infrastructure contractor for the federal government, DRTC provided topquality custodial and food service at Tinker Air Force Base, FAA Mike Monroney Aeronautical Center, and the OKC federal building complex. DRTC employees service approximately 7.1 million square feet every day and prepare three meals, 365 days a year for service member personnel at Tinker AFB. The custodial service at DRTC has maintained the highest CIMS certification since 2014.




DRTC, in partnership with SourceAmerica® since 1995, contracts with the Department of Transportation, the Department of Defense, and the General Services Administration, to generate more than 269 jobs to employ people with a significant disability or limiting condition. All employees received paid training and valuable work experience in this highly disability-inclusive workforce, which they use to continue to pursue their personal goals for employment.

Over the past year, DRTC continually met the challenges and needs of our customers with innovative services. Hospital grade fogging capabilities, high-touch cleaning, and increased frequency of service throughout the federal contracts are a few examples of DRTC rising to the challenge for our customers.

DRTC's Production Center worked with 26 businesses such as Hitachi, Jasco, Kodak, Petra/Sela, Taylor Valve and others last year to complete 140 contracts. Our team of 106 people enjoyed working on a variety of projects for internationally-known brands. With major policy changes expected that would greatly impact serices and programs for people with disabilities, DRTC is taking a pro-active approach to helping them reach their employment and personal goals.



### **DRTC Awards & Promos**

DRTC continued to manufacture beautiful custom awards through <u>DRTC Awards</u>. In addition to awards and trophies, our dedicated and trained staff assist with branding needs through promotional items of all kinds, including: screenprinting. Screen printing apparel involves several quality checks: ensuring screens are lined up correctly, ink, t-shirt sizes and colors, and also durability of the cured item. Every job provided skills-building opportunities, allowing individuals at DRTC to equip themselves with valuable experience to reach their employment goals.

People employed at DRTC contributed to the success of multiple government agencies through the State Use Program of Oklahoma. DRTC has served as a member of the Program for more than 20 years, providing meaningful long-term employment and job training for employees on the main campus.



## **Programs**

At DRTC's main campus, we provide programs and services for people with significant disabilities. In our <u>Vocational Services Programs</u>, more than 100 people received job skills training and valuable skill development while earning a paycheck.

Transportation and other services are provided to accommodate people with disabilities and support full access to employment and the community.

Opportunities for employment for people with disabilities are also provided through a small team approach at businesses across the metro. Our Mobile

<u>Workforce</u> is a highly-skilled team providing valuable labor in production and assembly in businesses such as Jerky.com, Digital Designs and ATC Drivetrain.

People with more significant disabilities are also provided opportunities for access to employment and the community through our Special Needs Program. Specialized transportation and one-on-one assistance allows people who have higher needs or may be adjusting to retirement to earn a wage and fully participate in their community.


# **Employment Services**

The Employment Services Program provided specialized support for people with disabilities to realize their goals for employment. DRTC maintains a placement rate of 90%. That equates to 115 people who found employment with the support of a DRTC Employment Training Specialist (ETS). DRTC's goal is to open the door wider for people with disabilities. This year 20 new businesses discovered the value of inclusion through our job matching services in the community. Ninety-percent of 115 people with disabilities met their community employment goal in DRTC Employment Services in FY22.


#### **Ability-Focused Job Fairs**

A new partnership between DRTC and Goodwill Industries of Central Oklahoma connected job seekers with employers in 2021. More than 150 people with disabilities or limiting conditions from across the metro attended these Ability-Focused Job Fairs that emphasize applicants' abilities. Participating employers learned about best practices for hiring and retaining workers with disabilities and/or limiting conditions.

DRTC clients also attended, visiting with employers like Amazon, NewView Oklahoma, OKC Fairgrounds, and EMBARK to learn more about employment opportunities that may interest them.


